CLERGY COMMENT



THINK BEFORE WE SPEAK

OVER the last couple of weeks, I've been looking through books and articles in the hope that something would leap out at me for this month's Clergy Comment.

I found it in a Thoughts for the Day book by Eddie Askew called Chasing the Leaves. These thoughts are like the Thought for the Day you can hear on Radio 4 each morning at around 7.50am. This thought for the day resonated with me and so I'm sharing it with you now.

It is based on a verse from John's Gospel:

Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.

These are Eddie Askew's words: "I wasn't sure I'd read it right. The words were on a white van belonging to the water supply company. When I got home I checked it out on the internet. Yes, it was part of their publicity and was in their annual report. The slogan read, 'Your water is safe in our hands.'

"My water? I won't venture into the medical aspects of whose and which water they were claiming, but water safe in their hands?

"I can accept water safe in a reservoir, or even safe in a bucket, but safe in their hands?

"All my attempts at holding water in my hands come to nothing. It trickles away. Even when I rinse the soap off my face, I have to be quick or the water's gone. And I reckon so will the slogan be when the publicity department reactivates its sense of humour.

"I suppose it's just a nice example

of people taking themselves a little bit too seriously, but we do need to take care about the way we use language.

"It's so easy to mean well but for another sense to creep into the words we use without us realising it. And the words come out with the wrong message.

"Let's think before we speak, and let's wait a moment before we respond to the things other people say to us. Misunderstanding is so easy – and so difficult to sort out when it's happened. Think twice before we react.

"Guard me, Lord, from speaking too much, too often, and with too little thought."

I think the last sentence should be my daily mantra as I often speak first and think second, which is not a good plan, then I have to do some very quick damage limitation!

PSALM OF THE MONTH

PSALM 111 - chosen by DAVID WILSDON

THIS psalm begins and ends with praise. It is also an 'acrostic' in that each half verse begins with a different letter, in order, of the Hebrew alphabet, giving it a sense of completeness.

The word for praise at the end of verse 10 begins with the last letter of the alphabet (Taw).

Otherwise, following a stated intention to give thanks to the Lord, reasons for these thanks are given, most of them relating to the history of the people of Israel, and concluding with a reminder of the wisdom and benefit of maintaining one's appreciation of God's presence.

This content of the psalm makes it suitable for congregational worship.

1. Alleluia, ("Praise the

Lord!")

I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart, in the company of the faithful and in the congregation.

2. The works of the Lord are great,

sought out by all who delight in them.

3. His work is full of majesty and honour

and his righteousness endures for ever.

4. He appointed a memorial for his marvellous deeds;

the Lord is gracious and full of compassion.

5. He gave food to those who feared him;

he is ever mindful of his covenant.

6. He showed the people

the power of his works in giving them the heritage of the nations.

7. The works of his hands are truth and justice;

all his commandments are sure.

8. They stand fast for ever and ever.

They are done in truth and equity.

9. He sent redemption to his people;

he commanded his covenant for ever;

holy and awesome is his name.

10.The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom;

a good understanding have those who live by it;

his praise endures for ever.

BBC newsreader lan to be guest speaker

lain joined the local hospital radio service while at the University of Edinburgh. He went on to work in various computer-related jobs while attempting to pursue a radio career.

Purdon joined BBC Scotland in May 1973 becoming a newsreader and continuity announcer for the Radio 4 Scotland opt-out service. From 1975-1978 he was also a regular TV announcer on BBC One Scotland. He was then appointed to lead the announcer team at the launch of BBC Radio Scotland in 1978, also presenting music magazine programmes.

In 1982, he moved to BBC Radio 2 where he became editor of the presentation team until 1994. After a year in local radio at BBC CWR, followed by a spell of freelancing with BBC Radio 4 and BFBS UK, he moved in April 1995 to the BBC World Service delivering news bulletins on the hour and summaries on the halfhour. These broadcasts are heard around the world.

lain Purdon read the last ever news bulletin from Bush House at 11am on July 12th 2012, moving immediately to complete the shift at New Broadcasting House which entered service that day. He retired from the BBC staff in October 2013 but continued to work as an occasional relief newsreader on the World Service until May 2016. After 43 years of delivering BBC news he felt that was enough for anyone!

TRAVELLERS' TALES

A TRIP TO AUSTRALIA - Simon and Pauline Holloway

AUSTRALIA IS BURNING

IN the context of a special service at the Anglican Cathedral of St Andrew's, Sydney, on Sunday, January 19th, Dr Stead, the Bishop of South Sydney, gave a compassionate and moving address about our response to those affected by the bushfires.

Earlier in the Service of Prayer for those Affected by the Bushfires, some facts and figures were shared about the overall situation in the nation - many hundreds of thousands of wildlife and livestock died, 28 people died including three voluntary fire workers from New South Wales, 3,000 homes were destroyed and an area larger than the size of England has been burnt. The purpose of the service was to provide sympathy, comfort and support, including thanks to the fire services, who were represented in the service as well as the Governor of NSW Her Excellency The Honourable Margaret Beazley.

After bible readings of Psalm 46, Job 1 and 2 (selections) and Luke 13v1-5 and a choir anthem of Rutter's Psalm 23, Dr Stead outlined 'four contrasting responses' during times of suffering as in the recent bushfires across Australia.

First is a positive response of compassion. Job's comforters got it right when they just came and sat with him in the ash heap, wept with him and did not speak. Sometimes no words are appropriate but our physical presence does make a difference.

The second response was 'Give Up on God', as reported by Job's wife, who said, "Curse God and die!", when she saw his suffering. Some today as then ask, "How can you believe in a good God when suffering comes to the innocent?"

Suffering causes some to doubt the existence of God. There are no simple answers. Job was innocent and yet still suffered. Evil and suffering in this world do not however disprove God. One answer



is to look at the cross. Jesus was innocent and yet suffered. God is not distant or inactive but suffers for us and with us. Yet we still hurt when we suffer.

A third response is to blame and accuse others. Job was falsely accused by his 'comforters' of being a wicked sinner under God's judgment. This may seem right but the attitude is poisonous. Jesus refused to link suffering with sin in many places recorded in the New Testament, including Luke 13.

Bushfires are not God's judgment. We cannot blame the government, the agencies or even the environment changes. We cannot control the climate and the environment, although care for them is part of our creation mandate. It is a harsh world, that is broken and perishing. CS Lewis reminded us that suffering may be 'God's severe mercy'. God warns us because He loves us. This world is broken and so prepare for the next.

The final response is to repent. That is to turn around and come back to God as our loving and faithful creator and redeemer. Give up our indifference and hostility towards God and turn back to Him in faith. Trust God to be *our* God even when we suffer.

Job responds this way in Chapter 42 and earlier in Chapter 13 we read, "Even though He slay me, yet will I hope in Him." In short, the four responses are: negative ones – turn away or turn against God and each other or positive ones – turn to God in repentance and faith and turn towards each other in compassion and love.

The hymns and prayers in the service were also designed to bring comfort and support. To the tune of Finlandia, an 18th Century hymn, Be Still, My Soul, led into the offering to support Anglican Aid and Anglicare, two national agencies on the ground giving help to the bereaved and displaced. We heard interviews with Chaplains for Operation Bushfire Assist and Disaster Recovery Network. Donations can be sent via www.anglicanaid.org.au/nswbushfire-appeal.

We saw first-hand the devastation caused by the bushfires on Kangaroo Island - half the size of Cyprus - which had suffered burning of over half the Island yet was reopened to the public when we made a day visit from Adelaide.

We saw some animals in the wildlife park in the middle of the island and the green shoots already springing up after the devastation. There were signs of hope and new life even there. This is a link to explain about Bushfire support on Kangaroo Island - https://www.sealink.com.au/bushfire-update.

Later, in Singapore, we met the niece of our hosts who came from Sydney. Livinia and her family had been evacuated five times from their rural home south of Sydney because of the bushfires. This brought it all home to us on a personal level.

But we thank God that some rains have come, dowsed many of the fires and stopped the spreading to new areas.

So much depends also on the wind strength and direction. And that, prayerfully, is all in God's hands.

On our return to the UK, we saw the Channel 4 documentary, Is the recent apocalyptic Australian bushfire what the future looks like?

THE Candlemas service was held on Sunday, February 2nd at St Giles's Church and, although Anna Crabbe was still recovering from her recent knee operation, she had put the service together.

David Wilsdon led the service, assisted by Diana Mellows, John Thorne, Maureen Lane and Jean Falconer, who all helped to 'share the light' with the congregation.

As the congregation arrived at church, they were each offered a candle - a tea-light - for use later in the service.

Light influenced all aspects of the service from the well-chosen hymns such as This Little Light of Mine, to the readings from the prophet, Malachi, and the Apostle, Luke.

In order to illustrate the story of Christ's presentation in the temple, the painting by Fra Angelico was displayed. The picture is full of light and shows Mary and Joseph in the temple offering Jesus to God, as the Scriptures said they should do.

In the Temple they met the old man, Simeon, who is seen holding Jesus and declaring, "I have seen your salvation, the light of the world."

Nine candles on a table at the front of the church were lit symbolising the nine letters of Candlemas.

AT the onset of the Second World War, Churchill famously said, "The lights are going out all over Europe". He was not wrong. Our nation was plunged into the greatest conflict in world history. I am one of the post-war groups of 'Baby Boomers', born in the late 1940s.

Born at home in a tied cottage, owned by the landowners who provided work, sustenance and accommodation for us country 'peasants', I enjoyed a wonderful rural childhood somewhat in the mould of Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn. Unlike the fictitious characters of my comparison, I did not live in the America's deep south, my boyhood was spent in the tranquil framing region of a very rural Worcestershire.

Also known as 'The Teme Valley', I grew up in a prosperous hopgrowing region where life was good. I witnessed the end of rationing and the progressive return to normality following the 1939-45 austerity. Indeed, I lived in the generation when the world's first ever youthdriven culture burst on society changing the social face of this 'green and pleasant land' forever.

English pop groups rocked the world, Carnaby led international fashion trends, British-built Mini cars won the Monte Carlo rally and the England football team won football's world cup. I think it fair to say the lights were coming back on all over Europe.

In the mid-1960s, I sojourned north to County Durham to further my education. Like many of my generation, I was full of ambition and aspiration preparing to launch a life in pursuit of fame and fortune. My life voyage has been exciting and wide-ranging; both challenging and fulfilling. I have travelled the world and have known both success and failure. I think it fair to say that over half a century in life's 'fast lane', with places to go, people to see and things to do that I lost sight of the values and lifestyle that defined my working-class rural vouth.

Jumping forward in my story, I am delighted to report that a 258-mile

retirement relocation to Heathstock, near Stockland, has succeeded in recapturing much of that rural life idyll experience as a boy growing up on a farm in Worcestershire.

My wife and I were fortunate to meet the 'legendary' Nancy Patch, whose family run a 200-acre dairy farm in Heathstock. To our delight, Nancy allowed us tenancy of Meadow View, a traditional farmhouse bungalow, high on the hill outside Stockland. The clue is in the name, Meadow 'View'. We look out on miles of beautiful Devon countryside with the iconic Beacon illuminating the night sky which serves as a landmark to ensure we do not get lost on the rabbit warren of narrow lanes that wind through the rural landscape.

Nancy is an accomplished and keen gardener, but the demands, pressures and exigencies of farming life allow her little time for tending the home garden. It has been my delight to beaver away redesigning and landscaping the lawns and borders that surround Meadow View. Just maybe the share value of Otter Nurseries has benefitted significantly from my investment in plants and shrubs over the past five years.

Moving on, they say here, 'You need three generations in the churchyard before you are considered a local'. Mmm... as I move on through my 70s, I fear that I will not live long enough to properly qualify as a local, but I am a country man born and bred, I am delighted to have landed in this wonderful part of the world to rediscover my country roots and values. As I say, don't believe what they say about retirement. It's great, as is my home in what I like to call Heathstock Haven; time enough to enjoy village quiz nights, country shows and make new friends.

The gift, as they say, is life itself! Enjoy this and every day of life hey?

Cliff Sochon was the elected speaker to compere and speak upon the chosen subject. The topic was chosen as one from those provided at the last forum. This month's subject was: Is Big Brother too big?

The meeting was started after a mountain of food, supplied by our lovely ladies, was consumed.
