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### FOOD AND FAITH: ALL IS HARVEST

WELCOME to September and the month in which we begin our celebrations of all things rural, especially thanking God for our farmers, gardeners and growers.

This month, we are holding harvest festival services in Dalwood, Stockland and Shute parishes, with more services in Yarcombe and Kilmington planned for early October.

It is good for us to recognise the hard work of so many parishioners, who quietly get on with the job of producing food for us to enjoy, and this year has been particularly challenging because of the weather.

Although if you have attended any of the village shows and seen the high quality produce on display, you will appreciate with me the perseverance, tenacity and skill of many in our communities who have grown marvellous entries from seed to bring to the table.

Do feel free to attend any of the harvest festival services on a day and at a time that best suits you.

This month, we are holding our first forest church on a farm, and will be outdoors thanking the farmers and thanking God for all the good things around us, which as Christians, we believe are sent from heaven above.

No doubt there will be occasion for us to sing classic songs of thanksgiving, including We Plough the Fields and Scatter.

We extend a particular invitation and welcome to all our parishioners but especially, this month, to those of you who have green fingers, or soil under your nails.

Mindful of those in our communities who are suffering

hardship, we will be continuing the tradition of holding a collection at each church for tinned and packages items to be donated to our local food bank, and of taking up a collection to support organisations working in places in the world where harvests fail.

The Bible is full of references to seedtime and harvest, such as this verse from the letter to the Galatians, which calls upon us all to remember that our daily words and actions also contribute to our harvest within our communities:

"So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith."

### MY FAVOURITE HYMN

In this feature each month, a different person will share with us their favourite hymn and reasons why. This month, **Sally Huscroft**, of Kilmington, chooses **O Jesus I have Promised to Serve You to the End.** 

MY secondary school was Thornbury Grammar School, in South Gloucestershire, and our school hymn was O Jesus I have Promised to Serve You to the End.

We obviously sang it regularly, but memorably, at the annual Founders Day service at St Mary's Church... a beautiful church in lovely surroundings. It was in the vicarage in which the hymn was written in 1869, by the then incumbent, John Bode.

There are several versions of the tune, but of course we always sang it to Thornbury, I do find it difficult to sing it to anything else.

The first time I read the lesson in church was as a sixth former at Founders Day, and it was a very impressionable moment looking at the school gathered together in the

church. Throughout my (long) life I have found this hymn to be very supportive, relevant and a comfort.

I remember with fondness my time at Thornbury, having moved away at 18 and had many more wonderful, happy years since.

1 O Jesus, I have promised to serve Thee to the end; be Thou forever near me, my Master and my Friend; I shall not fear the battle if Thou art by my side, nor wander from the pathway if Thou wilt be my Guide.

2 O let me feel Thee near me, the world is ever near; I see the sights that dazzle, the tempting sounds I hear; my foes are ever near me, around me and within; but, Jesus, draw Thou nearer, and shield my soul from sin.

3 O let me hear Thee speaking in accents clear and still, above the storms of passion, the murmurs of self-will; O speak to reassure me, to hasten or control! O speak, and make me listen, Thou Guardian of my soul! 4 O Jesus, Thou hast promised to all who follow Thee that where Thou art in glory there shall Thy servant be; and, Jesus, I have promised to serve Thee to the end; O give me grace to follow, my Master and my Friend!

### **Cultivating chance**



### Rev John joins Five Alive as associate priest

REV John Lees has been working in the Five Alive team for over a year and now joins it formally this month as a licensed minister.

John has served in Exeter Diocese for eight years and is currently Bishop's Officer for Self-supporting Ministry. Until March, he was National Officer

John is a self-supporting ordained minister (SSOM) – someone who undertakes all the tasks clergy normally deal with, but who is not paid by the Church of England.

SSOMs work in a wide range of contexts. John is a Minister in Secular Employment, with a strong focus on the world of work though his role as a career coach. He has written 15 books on careers and work including 12 editions of How to Get a Job You Love.

John is a prebendary of Exeter Cathedral. His seat in the choir is named after Bishop Oldham, Cathedral Dean in the early 1500s and



founder of Manchester Grammar School. John said: "This is very pleasing for me as my Dad and my wife both hail from Manchester".

John lives in Colyton with his wife, Jan, a writer and painter and they have two adult sons.

John is a keen photographer and film maker, and has recently created two films recounting First World War stories relating to his native Holyhead. He is an Associate of the Royal Photographic Society (ARPS).

John adds: "It's a real privilege to be joining Five Alive having become gradually more involved in activities since May last year. It's been very exciting working on a range of projects including reviving services in Whitford, and pleasing to see the numbers coming to our new monthly service. Every part of the mission community has welcomed me, whatever I have been doing. I look forward to working even more closely with Julie [Lomas] and the leadership team".

### BY ROYAL APPOINTMENT

HAVING been appointed to the mission community in October 2021 as the priest-in-charge, that three-year appointment would have come to an end in a few months' time.

The church is delighted to announce that instead, Rev Julie Lomas is going to be relicensed to the Five Alive Mission Community as the rector.

The news came through in an email from the Cabinet Office, Lord Chancellor's Ecclesiastical Office, dated July 31st and stating: "You will be pleased to know that The King has approved your appointment as Rector of Kilmington, Stockland, Dalwood, Yarcombe and Shute."

This means the mission community is now in a permanent state and Rev Julie has what is known as "the living", which in days of yore would have meant she was entitled to the Tithes, or one-tenth, of the income from each parish. It also means that she is now in post until such time as she resigns, which we hope will be some years away.

At the same time, Rev John Lees has offered his services to the mission

community and will be taking up his new role as associate priest from September, thus enhancing the ministry team which includes Anna Crabbe, Chris Shepherd and Gill Heighway as our Lay Ministers, Juletta Obudo as our Families outreach worker and Marc Kastner who is about to begin his final year of training for ministry.

You are invited to a special service of celebration, and to witness the formal licensing of Rev Julie and Rev John, at 4pm on Sunday, September 8th in St John the Baptist Parish Church, Yarcombe, followed by refreshments. It is hoped many are able to come along will join the Archdeacon of Exeter, The Ven Andrew Beane, to help mark this occasion.

Why a royal appointment? The answer lies in Yarcombe as this parish falls under the patronage of the crown. The other parishes come under the Bishop of Exeter, and the crown and bishop alternate with the formal appointments process, and so this time, it is the turn of the crown to deal with all the paperwork!

### MIRACLES AND FUN AT CLUB

THE Baptist Church, Kilmington, has been running the Summer Holiday Club since 2012, although I remember attending holiday bible clubs there as a child.

The theme this year was Guardians of Ancora, based on a Scripture Union app of the same name, aimed at primary aged children. This year, the first week of August was filled with stories from the Bible of miracles that Jesus performed told through crafts, games, drama and puppets. We also enjoyed snacks, workouts, fun and lots of laughter.

We were able to welcome 70-plus children mainly aged five-11 years from various schools in the area, plus a few visiting children too. The children were wonderfully enthusiastic, learning songs, doing actions and asking great questions. Seeing the children getting to know each other and encouraging one another is great. This year, we also had 15 youth volunteers, over half of



whom came up through the holiday clubs themselves, join us from Lyme Regis, Axminster, Kilmington and Whitford.

We finish the week with a Sausage Sizzle, on the Friday afternoon. This year, our catering team served over 150 attendees, parents, carers, family, friends and volunteers some delicious hot dogs. This was followed by a short taste of what had happened through the week. The children performed songs, there was an overview of the stories covered, our puppet team preformed a song and a slide show of photos was shown.

On the Sunday morning, our week culminated with the Holiday Club Celebration service, we welcomed our Holiday Club families and our church family to share and celebrate together all that had been going on in the previous week. Every child a personalised certificate for all their efforts, and once again the children put

on a great show for all who attended.

We had a wonderful week, with the 25-plus adult volunteer team getting almost as much out of being involved at the children and young people who attended.

Our adult volunteer team was made up of people from The Baptist Church, Kilmington, and St Giles's Church, with Rev Julie Lomas on the team too. We were also blessed with props for staging from St Micheal's Church, Shute, and costumes from the open the book team at St Peter and St Paul Church, Uplyme. So many people were involved in making the club a success from those who were working behind the scenes and helping with advance preparations to all those involved during the week. ON Saturday, July 13th, air cadet Sophie Mackenney, 16, set out from the foot of Mount Snowdon on an endurance undertaking of epic proportions – and with support from a number of celebrities.

The Dalwood teenager's aim was to climb the highest mountains in England, Scotland and Wales in under 24 hours – known as the Three Peaks Challenge.

Under the patronage of explorer Sir Ranulph Fiennes and with support from Bear Grylls amongst others, Sophie took on this gruelling endeavour to raise funds for her air cadet squadron, 1064, in Honiton.

Sophie's team consisted of two support climbers, James Richards and her dad, Andrew 'Mac' Mackenney, along with support driver Michael 'Aitch' Howell-Walmsley.

With sponsorship from Mazda UK, the team drove to the base of 3,560-ft Mount Snowdon in readiness for climbing their first peak.

Starting the stopwatch at exactly 8am, the route was easy at first, but soon turned into a challenging scramble over boulders and scree slopes. Every minute counted as they pushed on, racing passed those that had more time to take in the beauty of the surrounding landscape. Sophie's fitness showed through, reaching the summit of Snowdon in a staggering time of 1 hour and 58 minutes!

A short break and then it was back down to her awaiting support car and a 205-mile drive to mountain number two, Scafell Pike, the highest in England. From blue skies and fluffy clouds in North Wales, the Lake District was covered in a heavy blanket of grey and gloom. As the team pushed higher, they entered cloud where visibility dropped to 50 meters. The wind picked up and it started to rain, plummeting the windchill temperature to below zero – there was no time to dawdle in such conditions.

Dusk was rapidly approaching as Sophie reached the trig point at 3,209ft, atop England's highest mountain and then it was a rapid descent to the valley floor. They had been on the go for 13-and-a-half hours, were all tired, hadn't eaten a proper meal and were relying on sweets and cold rations to fuel their bodies.

Through the night they drove for 260 miles, arriving at the foot of the


UK's tallest mountain, Ben Nevis, at 3.15am. With head torches on, they packed essential survival kit for their final ascent of 4,413ft of gruelling climbing.

Darkness lifted, but there was only a short window of good visibility before the team climbed into the clouds and trudged their way through more murky conditions. For hours they zig-zagged up the rocky track, but eventually, with 400ft to go, they burst above the clouds and into bright sunlight. With the summit in sight, Sophie surged ahead, stopping the clock at 7.16am on Sunday, July 14th to mark the finish of her Three Peaks Challenge. Her total time – 23 hours and 16 minutes.

She'd endured over 10,000ft of climbing, 462 miles of driving, 18 miles of trekking and summitting the three highest mountains, but not for one minute did she give up.

At present, Sophie's fundraising stands at £3,265, over six times her original goal of £500! This money will now allow the squadron to purchase a range of expedition equipment, so

Heavy rain throughout the afternoon of the show did not deter competitors and local residents from turning out to see the beautiful flowers, fruit and vegetables on display.


Everyone enjoyed the very sociable gathering, with tea coffee and an array of homemade cakes on offer.

The teenage challenges she had to face in negotiating different and varied environments were made possible once she had the support of a trusted dog. There are many considerations to be taken on board in selecting a puppy that has the potential and character to take on the training to become a guide dog. The puppy has to be intelligent and of a placid nature. The wait to get a match between a dog and a person with limited sight can be considerable - sometimes taking up to two years. There are regular checks by a vet on the health of the dog and this is supported by the Guide Dogs for the Blind Association.

During the talk Alex, Lena's dog, behaved immaculately and set a fine example, to be followed by Hobson, who lives with Jo and Alex Dunbar. The third puppy was a much younger dog that is fostered by a volunteer. This short-term flexible arrangement means that a dog can be looked after while its owner, for



example, has a stay in hospital.

The difference to quality of life that having a guide dog makes is immeasurable and the Guide Dogs for the Blind Association is always appreciative of any help and support that they receive.

It was a pleasant Saturday morning rounded off with coffee and croissants.

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# Celebrating - Harvest

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### LET US WIPE OUT THE WET WIPES

WET wipes – why are we so addicted to them? Surface wipes, face cleansing wipes, floor wipes, make-up remover wipes, baby wipes, personal hygiene wipes, leather-cleaning wipes, dental wipes... do we really need them?

There are exceptions, of course, in the case of people with medical needs and for use in clinical environments, however, for the majority of the population, this is not a necessity.

The wipes are made of plastic fibres, taking 100 years to break down and then only into microplastics which marine life then swallow; eventually sneaking into the food chain. The UK, though ranking 21st in the world for size of population, is the second biggest user in the world, getting through 11billion wipes. You may have read that wipes make up between 80 per cent and 93 per cent of blockages in UK sewers and cost us (indirectly) £100million a year to deal with these blockages. Not to mention polluting

our rivers too. Owners of septic tanks will know that flushing wipes can cause unnecessary blockages. We also need to treat with extreme caution any words 'biodegradable', 'compostable' and 'flushable' on the packet because these words cause much public misunderstanding.

What about the single-use unnecessary plastic packaging they are wrapped in? Some baby wipes boast that they are 99.9 per cent water – in that case, perhaps use a flannel/cloth/cotton wool and warm/hot water? We could also use these more planet-friendly options for our faces as well, not to mention around the house. They could be made from recycling old cotton T-shirts or towels or they can be purchased online, in snazzy colours and patterns from zero-waste businesses. Use and pop in the washing machine with a load.


The ingredients in wet wipes have been found to have chemicals, including sodium benzoate, used as a preservative (it is also used in certain fireworks!), which can react with other ingredients causing skin irritation.

Another reason to ditch and switch.

The great news is that there is a proposed ban on the supply and sale of wet wipes across the UK, with legislation in place by the end of 2024. This follows a consultation where 95 per cent of the public who responded were in favour of the ban. It is to be hoped that the new Government will carry this through. There will be an exemption for the medical and care sector. Some major retailers, including Aldi and Boots, already produce plastic-free wipes. The slight downside is that the manufacturers will be given a further 18 months transition period to change their systems, meanwhile the pollution caused by these continues. This detritus is even changing the shape of the River Thames it seems.


Perhaps we, the public, can start to reduce dependence on wet wipes, making a conscience decision not to buy them, unless there is a medical need, of course.

Let's not give in to the big companies who have made us think that wet wipes are indispensable for a fast, convenient and hygienic life!

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
