WALK WITH ME THROUGH EASTER

I LOVE Easter more than Christmas. And no, it's not because of the amount of chocolate and cake that is on sale at Easter! And it's not because I prefer a bunny to an elf (although there is some truth in that).

I love Easter because of Christmas — and without Christmas there would be no Easter. These two Christian festivals enable us to remember and celebrate the coming of Jesus, firstly as the Son of God into the manger; and then we fast-forward and find ourselves celebrating his entry into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey; sharing in his the last supper; observing the cruelty and suffering of his death on the cross, and being laid to rest in the darkness of the tomb, before finally celebrating his resurrection in the garden.

Our preparations for Easter began on Ash Wednesday way back in February, and the season of Easter continues right through until the middle of May, although our focus in April is concentrated on the week





beginning with Palm Sunday on the 2nd, and then Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, before we join together with believers around the world to celebrate the resurrection on Easter Sunday, April 9th.

This year, I encourage and urge all of our readers to go to church for one or several of the special services being held in our area, to hear and experience afresh the astounding story of Jesus.

Whichever church you choose to visit you can be assured of a warm welcome and a seat at the back, along with an invitation to sing old familiar songs, pray familiar prayers and connect once more with the old rugged cross and the empty tomb.

Walk with me through the season of Easter and together may we thank God for the first resurrection day, and for Jesus, our Living Lord.

- 5. Why should I fear in evil days, when the malice of my foes surrounds me.
- 6. Such as trust in their goods and glory in the abundance of their

- 7. For no one can indeed ransom another or pay to God the price of deliverance.
- To ransom a soul is too costly; there is no price one could pay for it,

Art club reaches out to novice painters

AS well as our core function of being a place of worship we, the Dalwood Methodist Church, feel it is part of our mission to reach out into the community, and one of the ways we do this is with the art club we run.

The club started in October 2004 at the Axminster Methodist Church as a form of church outreach, and when that closed we brought it here to Dalwood.

There are other art clubs in the area

run on more traditional lines, but ours is aimed at those who perhaps had never painted before and would like teaching by encouragement in an informal atmosphere.

From the outset, the pastoral side of the meeting has been as important as the painting, and we have found that the relaxed atmosphere in no way impedes the individual's ability to make progress.

We meet at the chapel on every other Wednesday from 2pm until 4pm, and subscriptions are only £2 per session, which includes tea or coffee and biscuits. The price is low as we don't want people to be put off by being too expensive. At this sort of price we can't afford to get in demonstrators, as the mainstream clubs do, but look to improve our skills by sharing our talents with other members.

Bishop opens 'best kept secret' garden

THE garden of the Bishop's Palace is one of the best kept secrets in Exeter.

It covers three acres and is one of the most ancient in Devon. Bounded by the old Roman bank and city wall to the east, and by the cathedral to the west, it is a haven of peace in the middle of the city.

In spring it is a picture with wave after wave of spring flowers, starting with carpets of snowdrops, crocus, daffodils, narcissi and finally bluebells under the copper beech trees.

The garden is rarely open to the public, but this year, Bishop Robert, is opening the grounds in aid of Devon Historic Churches Trust, a countywide charity that offers grants for the repair and upkeep of the churches.

Everyone is invited to come and walk around the garden with family and friends, and glance up at the magnificent cathedral.

The open day will be on Sunday, April 2nd, 2-4pm. Entry: £4 and children free. No unaccompanied children please.

Saying goodbye: baby loss service

A SAYING Goodbye service will be held by The Mariposa Trust on Saturday, April 15th, 10.30am, at Exeter Cathedral.

This service is for anyone who has either personally lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in early years, or who has been affected by family members' or friends' loss.

Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children. This may be due to circumstance, infertility, or for other reasons — but all are welcome.

Babies and children are also invited to come with their families, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.

It is known that as 1 in 4 women suffer miscarriage and baby loss, most people will have contact with a significant number of people who have either personally suffered baby loss, or who have a partner or family member that has.

TO mark the anniversary of the Russian forces invading Ukraine, the Five Alive Mission Community decided to work once again with Devon charity CR2EE — www.CR2EE to collect supplies to be driven to the war-torn areas of Ukraine, and also neighbouring country Moldova.

Yet again, the response has been amazing, with contributions from each of the parishes collected in our churches over just a couple of weeks.

Hugh Scudder, who set up CR2EE about 30 years ago, arrived in Yarcombe on Sunday, March 5th with an empty estate car and, after giving us his eye-witness account of the situation and the needs of the people, he drove away with his car filled to the roof with our donations.

Hugh said: "I just wanted to say 'thank you' for the invitation to come to Yarcombe. I very much appreciate your support and prayers, not to mention the wonderful fellowship.

"I would also like to thank you for the donations of goods, only just fitted it all into my car, and £120 plus the cheque, all very much appreciated. Please continue to pray, so very important."

every six to eight weeks, so we will keep everyone informed of what is being asked for and how to donate via the five parishes.

Financial donations are also needed to pay for fuel. Thanks once again for all the support and donations.

Church of England update on blessings for same-sex couples

READERS of *The Parishes' Paper* will recall last month's issue included statements from the national church, and from our Diocese, both made in January (March issue, pages 20-21).

In February, General Synod met, debated, prayed and voted on the proposals put to them.

The Church of England issued a statement on February 9th.

The Church of England's General Synod has welcomed proposals which would enable same-sex couples to come to church after a civil marriage or civil partnership to give thanks, dedicate their relationship to God and receive God's blessing.

Synod members also voted to "lament and repent" of the failure of the church to welcome LGBTQI+ people and for the harm that LGBTQI+ people have experienced – and continue to experience – in churches

A motion which details and recognises a series of proposals put forward by the bishops on human identity and marriage was agreed by majorities in the Houses of Bishops, Clergy and Laity after a landmark debate over two days.

Earlier this week Synod members also met in small groups to consider and comment on a set of draft texts known as Prayers of Love and Faith, which could be used voluntarily in churches for couples who have marked a significant stage of their relationship such as a civil marriage or civil partnership.

Synod's comments will now guide the bishops as they refine those texts carefully and prepare new pastoral guidance for the Church on sexuality and marriage in the coming months before the prayers are formally commended for use in churches.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, and the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "It has been a long road to get us to this point.

"For the first time, the Church of England will publicly, unreservedly and joyfully welcome same-sex couples in church.

"The Church continues to have deep differences on these questions which go to the heart of our human identity.

"As Archbishops, we are committed to respecting the conscience of those for whom this goes too far and to ensure that they have all the reassurances they need in order to maintain the unity of the Church as this conversation continues.

"We hope that today's thoughtful, prayerful debate marks a new beginning for the Church as we seek a way forward, listening to each other and most of all to God.

"Above all we continue to pray, as Jesus himself prayed, for the unity of his church and that we would love one another."

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who led the debate and chairs the group which oversaw the development of the proposals, said: "This is a moment of hope for the Church. I know that what we have proposed as a way forward does not go nearly far enough for many but too far for others.

"It is my prayer that what has been agreed today will represent a step forward for all of us within the Church — including LGBTQI+ people — as we remain committed to walking together.

"We have always said we will listen carefully to Synod, so over the next few months we will reflect on everything which has been said and prepare new pastoral guidance for the Church on matters of sexuality and marriage. We will also refine the texts of Prayers of Love and Faith."

Tawain 'voices' heard at special prayer service

THIS year, the women of Taiwan had written the service for World Day of Prayer, which is shared around the world for 24 hours, starting in Western Samoa in the Pacific Ocean and ending in American Samoa.

Everyone gets to learn something about the country's geography, economics, politics, social life and religion. We heard from the 'voices' of Taiwanese women about some of the problems they face and how their faith has helped them. It was a lovely service at Kilmington Baptist Church and a wonderful lunch was enjoyed afterwards, including specially cooked Taiwanese beef soup with rice. Next year's service will be written by the Women of Palestine, which should also be very interesting.

SATURDAY, February 11th was a very special day for an even more special lady.

In St Augustine's Church in Seaton, following Mass, Shelagh Fearnley was presented with a Papal Award by Father Jacek Kostuck. This award, a decoration from the Holy See, Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice, is called The Order of St Gregory the Great. This honour was bestowed only to men until 1994 when women were then admissible to the Order.

The medal, very rarely given, is in recognition of Shelagh's significant charitable work, but in particular, her work with the Catholic Children's Society (Plymouth). The process from nomination through to Papal recognition has been a long one... some 19 months.

Shelagh is very well known in

Dalwood village, leading various organisations and being secretary for others, and has a reputation for getting things done.

However, the Catholic Children's Society, a voluntary charitable agency, has benefitted greatly from her input as chair over the past 10 years. She modernised the charity, moved it forward and had the vision and foresight necessary for future management.

Her professional background as a senior clinical psychologist meant that she was very well placed to have a deep understanding of families in need.

Those who know Shelagh admire her grit and determination and her championing of the underdog.

The award is so well deserved and comes with two privileges — the right to ride a horse through St Peter's Basilica and to be called a dame! Congratulations, Dame Shelagh.


A jigsaw library

It is well known in these days of rising costs that it is becoming increasingly expensive to maintain the fabric of the church and enhance the appearance of the churchyard.

These were the thoughts of the late Jan Bowden when she founded the organisation known as Friends of St Michael and All Angels in 1998. She felt that everyone had a duty to hand such an important piece of heritage to successors in as good, if not better, condition than it was inherited. To this end, together with the vicar and a loyal band of like-minded

people drawn from the village and its surroundings, she set to work organising fundraising activities.

Charity tractor run raises £3k



An 'abundance of the known' thanks to local authors' books

THERE is nothing more rewarding than being able to identify with books written about recognisable places and people — and often by writers whom are known to an area, town or village or even to the reader.

Stockland parish is fortunate to have a small selection of such texts: Behind the Hedges (Pauline Rook); A Journey Through the History of Stockland (Bryan Drew); and The Stockland Turbaries: Management for Wildlife and People (David J Allen, Geoff Pearce).

Arguably, these books are 'dip in books' — not lengthy reads, but picked up to glean snippets of information of the area lived in although the photos in all three are those to be pored over!

Pauline Rook's book covers a 20-year memoire of photography in the Blackdown Hills. Being commissioned to capture the spirit and essence of the Blackdown Hills, the book offers a kaleidoscope of places known, people known, familiar buildings, family names all part of a working snapshot of rural life and traditions.


Cider, cheese and rug makers, hedge layers (wicked maidens), visiting blacksmiths, shooting parties, evidence of yesteryear farming with abandoned ploughs, tip carts (putts) tractors and cottages partially consumed by plant growth all are included whilst home interiors are also featured.

Open a few pages and there is an abundance of the known — family names for starters, and for those whose families' span generations of local living a photo of themselves might just catch the eye, but then a much more youthful version. Outstanding photographs and a real trip down memory lane is the joy of this book.

Bryan Drew's book affords a complete history of the Stockland Parish — no stone is left unturned. Recently re-edited — second printing, though only two corrections in a text of 323 pages — every part of Stockland (once named Ertacomestoche) is visited, teased out and documented.

Living in Stockland? Be assured your house, your land, your families will all be referenced and accounted for!

Whilst it is a dip-into text, once opened it is difficult to be extracted from it. Any genuine wish to research something leads on to a related topic



and on and on — the detail covered by the text, by the one book demonstrates an author's love for his roots and heritage which daresay is also acknowledged by the reader who might proudly inwardly say they live there and know Bryan.


David Allen and Geoff Pearce are surely known to all in the parish? Mention wildlife photography, swallow counts, turbaries, conservation and their names are first to hand.

David has been a much-liked and respected source of botanical wisdom on the Blackdown Hills for many years and has had a life-long relationship with the Turbaries.

He has now created a valuable testament to that relationship in the publication, The Stockland Turbaries: Management for Wildlife and People, written with the assistance of local outstanding ornithologist and photographer Geoff.

David narrates the text guiding readers through the Stockland Turbaries — a string of seven irregularly-shaped parcels of land scattered across the parish of Stockland, from Bucehayes Common to the west of the Stockland Straight, to Horner Hill, deep in the Yarty valley.

These harbour a remarkable diversity of wildlife, having emerged out of a deep history which illustrates much about the social realities of this



landscape. Latterly, they have become a focus of much community effort, through the commitment of a handful of Stockland residents who recognise the value of this unusual parish-owned resource.

It is a beautifully written book, combining a deep ecological knowledge of the intimate landscapes of the Turbaries, with a historical context for their existence, and a record of a community's efforts over the last 30 years to maintain them for the benefit of the parishioners of Stockland.

This is a book full of contributions from members of the parish, their photographs and reminiscences.

She explained: "I never dreamt I'd be so lucky to witness mother nature in one of her most beautiful forms, especially not here in Kilmington from our home.

"We were settling down for the evening watching a film when our friends, Francesca Wilkes and Bradley Nortcliffe, contacted us querying a green light in the sky and sent us the news articles about the Northern Lights being visible.

"From that moment, I was outside looking around when my husband, James, suggested looking out from our bedroom window as it faces north.

"There it was; the pink and green glow. I was in complete awe and snapped as many pictures as I could. I felt a whirlwind of emotions and immense gratitude."





Leads for dogs order on local playing fields

USERS of Kilmington Playing Field will be aware that the trustees have been very concerned about the amount of dog fouling.

In July last year, notices were displayed showing the extent of the problem in the hope that it would prompt those dog walkers who were failing to 'pick up' and use the dog waste bin provided to be more responsible but, regrettably, there was only a small reduction in the amount of fouling.

The field is used by the local school and pre-school children and the amount of fouling has created an unpleasant and unhealthy environment for them and other users, so the trustees have considered it necessary to take further steps to try to eradicate the problem.

As it is believed that much of the fouling occurs when dogs are off the lead, East Devon District Council has agreed that Kilmington Playing Field should become a 'dogs on leads' area

when the new Public Spaces Protection Order 2023 — Control of Dogs takes effect on May 1st. Failure to comply with the order could result in a fine of £100.

The trustees regret that the failure of a minority has resulted in restrictions on the responsible majority of dog owners.

Why not make a simple swap and buy a re-useable stainless steel water bottle?


There are many available in local shops and online. It will take just a little while to get into the habit of filling it up and taking the bottle with you.




