

It is usual that parishes have to wait a while for a vicar to be replaced. For us it has been a long wait with many challenges due to pandemic. New skills have been quickly learnt, many are now used to 'Zooming' and different ways of communicating and keeping in touch. However it has been refreshing to actually join in person with others to worship and last week we had an outdoor service where we could all sing freely. By the time you read this we may be able to sing inside the church again.

#### **PSALM OF THE MONTH**

PSALM 86 - chosen by DAVID WILSDON

What a difference! If you agree that last month's Psalm of the Month, Psalm 58 is unlikely to feature in Christian worship, you might instead choose Psalm 86 to feature frequently; for rather than expecting believers to believe in a vengeful god who would approve of them bathing their feet in the blood of the wicked, it presents God being "gracious and full of compassion, slow to anger and full of kindness and truth."

- 1. Incline your ear, O Lord, and answer me, for I am poor and in misery
- 2. Preserve my soul, for I am faithful; save your servant, for I put my trust in you.
- 3. Be merciful to me, O Lord, for you are my God; I call upon

you all the day long.

- 4. Gladden the soul of your servant, for to you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.
- 5. For you, Lord, are good and forgiving, abounding in steadfast love to all who call upon you.
- 6. Give ear, O Lord, to my prayer and listen to the voice of my supplication
- 7. In the day of my distress I will call upon you, for you will answer me.
- 8. Among the gods there is none like you, O Lord, nor any works like yours.
- 9. All nations you have made shall come and worship you, O Lord, and shall glorify your name.
- 10. For you are great and do wonderful things; you alone are God.
- 11. Teach me your way, O Lord, and I will walk in your

truth; knit my heart to you, that I may fear your name.

- 12. I will thank you, O Lord my God, with all my heart, and glorify your name for evermore.
- 13. For great is your steadfast love towards me; for you have delivered my soul from the depths of the grave.

#### MENTAL HEALTH PROJECT SUPPORT IN LIGHT OF CORONAVIRUS

I LIVE locally in Stockland and am writing a little message about something I am excited — and a little bit terrified — to do in the next few months, and I would really appreciate anyone taking the time to read this.

With the last year being the horrible year that it has been for us all, we have had to spend so much of that time on our own and unable to see loved ones and family. Because of this, there has been a huge increase in the number of people needing support with their mental health during the coronavirus.

Recently, I have been wanting to find a way to help people who may be feeling this way and have felt like they have been struggling through the more difficult times.

Last year, I was hoping to celebrate my 21st birthday with a skydive, despite being terrified of heights! Unfortunately, I was unable to do it, so I thought this could be a perfect time to face my fears and hopefully raise some money for a great charity.

I have booked a jump for September 5th and, although the date could vary depending on Covid-19, I am really hopeful this will be something I will be able to achieve this year.

To raise money for mental health awareness, I have chosen a small charity called Shawmind. Focused on providing preventative support strategies to individuals, schools and workplaces through early intervention, training and supportive listening, the charity has recently brought all of their services online, now managing to reach further across the country than before and provide support to anyone who



needs it during this pandemic.

One of Shawmind's main services were the Breathe Cafes, which were a popular source of support. Before lockdown, this was a physical cafe in local areas where anyone could stop by for a coffee and have a chat with one of their volunteers, access supportive listening, signposting to services such as therapists and psychologists or to simply have a conversation to find out more about mental health without fear of any judgement and meet new people.

They were previously run-in existing cafes, so there is no set-up fee to the volunteer, and they allow the charity the space to have an open conversation with those who need it.

With the huge increase in the number of people needing support with their mental health during the impact of Covid-19, it's crucial, now more than ever, that individuals are able to access the help that they need as soon as possible.

Because of this, the charity is currently ensuring that all of these Breathe Cafes are amalgamated into online sessions twice per week, and they are hoping to be able to have these cafes based all over the UK and operating on a near-daily level.

Shawmind is also supporting children's mental health in schools across the UK, by way of training all teachers in mental health awareness, so that they are better placed to spot and support signs of distress in their students.

Around 75 per cent of mental illnesses begin before age 18, and a lot of the time, if they are dealt with soon enough, the individual is able to make a full recovery and not have their illness take over their life.

This is why the charity is aiming to help provide a preventative approach and help children and young people receive the support they need sooner.

# Jogle for Jude ride raises over £100k for hospital

A RECENT fundraising effort, in memory of the grandson of Dalwood residents Sue and Steve Jones, has raised an enormous £100,000.

The Jogle (John o'Groats to Lands End) for Jude bike ride took place on June 26th to raise funds for the Wallace and Gromit Appeal at Bristol Children's Hospital where three-year-old Jude Chinn was cared for.

Jude — son of the couple's daughter, Laura Jones, and her partner, Richard Chinn — was treated for a twisted bowel for before losing his life last year.

Jude's family and friends decided to take on the cycle challenge and his grandfather, Steve, has thanked *The Parishes' Paper* for supporting the event.

Steve added: "We have now completed the ride in memory of our late three-year-old grandson, Jude, who passed away in June 2020 and we are all so grateful to everyone who supported us and contributed to the cause, helping us to raise over £100,000 to date.

"An amazing figure and The Bristol Children's Hospital are so thankful to all concerned.

"We nearly failed in our attempt before reaching Scotland when the original hired support vehicle expired before leaving the collection town of Taunton where it was collecting most of the bikes!

"A hastily arranged replacement reached Scotland the next day at 3am. The 100-miles-a-day ride started on Saturday, June 26th at a very cold and bleak John o' Groats.

"The Scottish weather improved though and the route through the highlands of Scotland was bathed in

sunshine with stops for lunchtime swimming in the magnificent Loch Oich and Loch Lomand.

"Many punctures and bike fixes later, the reception the 17 riders received on arrival at Bristol Children's Hospital was immense with members of the public, friends and hospital staff turning out to give a magnificent reception which was covered by the *ITV News* team in Bristol. Jude's mum, Laura, was interviewed by so many radio stations along the route and even

national Heart Radio at breakfast time.

"A hog roast for the riders and support team was provided at Taunton Cricket Club and we were all overwhelmed by the hundreds of followers that cheered us in on Saturday, July 3rd.

"ITV also covered the finishing leg into Land's End where Jude's bother, Tobias, and his father, Richard, led the riders in to the very emotional finish line which was lined by so many supporters."





ON July 11th, Archdeacon Andrew Beane very kindly came to take a service for us at St Giles at 11am.

He had requested an outside service, so a few of us set up chairs, keyboard, and tables, carefully following the Archdeacon's instructions.

An enjoyable service ensued, begun by the very welcome announcement that we finally have a new vicar, or more technically, a Priest in Charge, coming to join us at the end of September.

The Revd Julie Lomas will be licensed at St Giles's Church, Kilmington, on Monday, October

11th at 7pm, with celebratory nibbles and drinks afterwards.

The Archdeacon delivered an interactive service with prayer stations and a bee trail. There were three stations; one to write a prayer on a leaf – quite tricky; one to create a wooden cross; and one where clay was provided to make a shape and imprint it with something around us – grass, a flower head, bark.

It was most enjoyable – we were encouraged to move around rather than being rooted to the spot! Through engagement and moving around, we are open to whatever is happening around us.

## Did you hear the bells ring?

DID you hear the bells? Nothing can compare with the rich sounds of bells being rung from a church tower but with strict rules in place for many months we have been denied the pleasure of hearing their beautiful tones.

We have a very keen team of ringers in Kilmington and they have not been idle during the pandemic.

Like so many churches around the country St Giles's Church has an amazing chiming device designed in 1821 by The Rev Henry Thomas Ellacombe so that the bells in his church could be rung by himself alone.

He had become so frustrated by the drunk and disorderly behaviour of the village ringers — something we do not have to worry about in Kilmington — who did exactly what and when they pleased, and as they had the only key to the ringing chamber, he was powerless to stop them.

To commemorate the installation of the Ellacombe apparatus in St Mary's Church, Bitton, South Gloucestershire, on June 26th 1821, a global bi-centenary ring began at noon in New Zealand on that day two hundred years later.

Four hundred churches in the UK and some three to four dozen in other countries around the world have this same device and many took part in the global ring. Celia had posted it on Facebook and she received many comments from other towers even from Canada and New Zealand.

I was fortunate to be in the tower with Richard Norman and Celia Dunsford for their hour-long ring, they took it in turns to work through a varied programme of well-known songs and tunes, which included The Ellacombe Hymn, which was played twice by Celia, Frere Jacques, Jingle Bells, Love Divine, Pop Goes the Weasel and Pieces by Grieg and Vivaldi and lots more. The programme began and ended with the Westminster Chimes. Many

people remarked on hearing the tunes and what a pleasure it was. One or two people were invited to come up and have a 'ring', they enjoyed it and would like to be asked again.

Finding sufficient competent ringers to toll six bells is sometimes a bit of a headache for the tower captain, and now that restrictions are nearly at an end, the full

complement of ringers must be found for each service so maybe The Rev Ellacombe to the rescue, sometimes?

Celia and Richard made me very welcome and I really enjoyed spending time with them and such an ingenious invention which is two hundred years old and still chiming perfectly. Well done both of you and thank you so much.

The annual meeting of Frogs will be held at St Giles's Church on Tuesday, August 3rd starting at 7pm to discuss the accounts and the society's plans for the future.

An ongoing problem for Frogs is finding more people who can help to spread the load on the small group of individuals who have borne the brunt of the physical work in the churchyard.

To this end, Frogs will be holding a working party in the churchyard on Saturday, August 14th from 10am until 12noon. There will be jobs for all levels of fitness and age. Hot drinks and cakes will be served and these working parties have, in the past, have been very successful social events. Non-members are very welcome. ## THE DELUGE

ON bidding June farewell and having at long last enjoyed some sunshine, July was heralded in with perhaps one of the worst downpours — utter deluge — of rain witnessed in the parish's history.

Monday, June 28th — not only did it rain, it literally bounced off the pavements and roads; and it continued to do so for well into the night and early Tuesday morning.

More seriously, the aftermath: the flooding and then as the waters receded the debris and the damage left in its wake.

The parish was not left

unscathed: parts of the village faced much destruction with flooded fields, bridges washed away, walls bowled over, and tarmac lifted — the photos tell the story.

The sun came out bringing with it some of the hottest weather recorded in the UK; plants, vegetables, grass all scorched unless some desperate watering was lavished on them. The farmers were out in force in the early evenings cutting and bailing — sensibly avoiding the 30-degree daytime temperatures; far too hot! Sometimes the call must be for some moderation regarding the ever-increasing unpredictable extremities of our climate.

## Club discusses local-set novel

STOCKLAND'S book club met at the Kings Arms on Saturday, July 17th to discuss Remarkable Creatures by Tracy Chevalier.

This was a pertinent choice for the group as much of the text is set in Lyme Regis and Charmouth. For local readers this is a bonus – knowing the setting from personal experience.

Monmouth Beach, Seven Rocks Point, the Snakes' Graveyard, the Undercliffe, the Venn and, of course, The Cobb are all referenced.

The novel presents a delightful weave of fiction and historical facts. Its focus is on the discovery of fossilised creatures by Mary Anning and her determination to save them from the ravages of the local storms and tides. These included an ichthyosaurus, a plesiosaurus, a pterodactyl and a squaloraja. It also records her struggles against a male-dominated society to gain credibility and recognition for her finds and indeed for her challenging contribution to the scientific thinking of the early 1800s.

Debate was lively and thought provoking with the session sticking to the main discussion points — it was genuinely enjoyable.

The last 10 minutes were spent

reviewing some of the more recent reads of the group. As such, several

books were recommended — in particular, A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles. Preceded by a barrage of accolades with over a million copies sold and judged by book club member Paul Spencer as a "wonderful book to read in lockdown or indeed out of lockdown".

The novel is set in Russia, immediately after the Revolution. Count Alexander Rostov, recipient of the Order of Saint Andrew, member of the Jockey Club, Master of the Hunt is sentenced to house arrest in the Hotel Metropol. Deemed an unrepentant aristocrat by a Bolshevik tribunal, the count has been sentenced to house arrest indefinitely, but instead of his usual suite, he is detained in an attic room while Russia undergoes decades of tumultuous upheaval.

Although living in a constricted space, this doesn't prevent the count from speculating about all the mysteries of human existence: seen as an elegant, witty and delightfully written novel with a deliciously surprising choice of vocabulary.

Perhaps its resonance lies in the topical questions as to how happiness is attained, how to make

connections and make a difference to one another's lives, even in the strangest, saddest and most restrictive circumstances. A tale for today.

A few other reads also suggested by the group included The Great Western Beach by Emma Smith: an autobiography offering a delightful recollection of childhood in Cornwall between the wars; Without Prejudice by Nicola Williams: a fastpaced gripping courtroom drama focussing on the inherent prejudices facing a black female barrister great story with a challengingly complex ending; Agent Sonya by Ben MacIntyre and Head Long by Michael Frayn — clever and witty were also enjoyed by individual members.

The local book club always invites its members to suggest and recommend good reads to the rest of the group. This gives insight into a wider range of books for members. All new people welcome. The August meeting for the book group will be on Saturday, August 14 at 10.30am at the Kings Arms. For further information please contact Jane Griffiths on 01404 831207.

David is most upset when the clock is a second out of sync with Greenwich Mean Time. After moving to the village from Hertfordshire, via Chard and Shorebottom some 43 years ago, he was shown the workings of the clock by Gerald Phillips and, of course, John Salter.

About 30 years ago, he undertook the job of 'keeper time' which he has dutifully performed all this time.

Various helpers have wound the clock whilst David has been away but regulation and resetting the time is up to him.

Remedial work to strengthen the tower and other work causes dust and debris to sometimes get clogged in the intricate mechanism of this hand-built work of art. Changes in climate are documented and there are old pennies keeping the balance that are moved to keep accurate time.

Thankfully, David is a very well qualified and respected engineer and takes his responsibility very seriously for which we are all grateful.



BAKED BERRY CHEESECAKE by M Berrie

## A simple dessert for the summer

AN easy quick simple dessert so that the summer can be enjoyed out of the kitchen.

#### Serves 6-8

- 12 digestive biscuits, crushed
- 50g melted butter
- 50g caster sugar

#### For the filling:


- 300g light soft cheese


