D-DAY 80 – LIGHT OF PEACE

THIS month we will mark the 80th anniversary of the audacious and courageous invasion of Normandy that began on June 6th 1944 with the military offensive known as Operation Overlord.

In our communities there will be opportunities to reflect on the events that signalled the beginning of the end of the second world war, although that was to take a further 11 months in Europe (VE Day May 8th 1945) and over a year for the war to end in the pacific region (VJ Day September 2nd 1945). For many of us the stories of war and heroism, sacrifice and victory come from the films we have watched, the books we have read, and for some of us, the eye witness accounts of those who were there and who are still alive to tell their tale.

On Thursday June 6th church bells will be rung across the nation at 6.30pm and Beacons will be lit at 9.15pm. I am grateful to all who will enable these things to happen in and across our community here in East Devon on that day. The aim and focus of the day are to remind us all of our deep desire for Peace. If you are in the vicinity of Kilmington do join in with our village events as St Giles's Church, Parish Council and RBL branch join together to mark this event (see picture).

In the Bible we often read the word

"peace" and some of us will know that the translation of the word peace is from a Hebrew word, "shalom." It is a word that can be used as a greeting ("hello") and as a farewell ("goodbye"). In John chapter 20 verse 21 we read "Then Jesus said again, "Peace be with you. It was the Father who sent me, and I am now sending you in the same way."

Just as Jesus came to demonstrate the way of peace between people,

and with God, now it is our turn to live as if we believe these words. We are to be the bearers of the good news of God's peace – not just the ending of hostilities between waring factions, although that must be a priority especially in today's world – but the peace that passes all understanding, that brings wholeness and that is a blessing.

Peace is a gift, something to be received and shared, and it all begins with the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, continues through the life and witness of his followers and can be seen even today being worked out in the lives of ordinary people in each of our villages, and as we meet together we do so to encourage one another, to support and build each other up in our faith, and to share the good news of what we have received with other people.

In St Paul's letter to the earliest church in the city of Philippi he wrote these words:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the ("shalom") peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. ch 4 v 6-7

May we all share in the "shalom," the peace of God.

MY FAVOURITE HYMN

MY feeling is that God is always with me, not just when I am out for a walk. I look around the countryside at this time of the year and I can see that God has planned everything. He never lets us down.

As the chorus says "trust and obey" Therefore we must play our part and do His goodwill. As my late father always believed in what he called the "guiding hand", he would tell me that when I was upset over some personal loss, he would say that God did not intend that to happen.

We used to often sing this hymn when with other teenagers we would gather at a house for what was known as a "squash" on a Saturday evening. Hymns and choruses were sung, a Bible reading and an address.

Afterwards there was tea and cakes. Nobody ever went home early. There was always a "squash" somewhere on a Saturday evening. As the Chorus says " Trust and Obey, for there is no other way". Looking back I do not think any of us ever went very wrong.

THE Open the Book team visited three schools in the Five Alive Mission Community in April to tell the story of two followers of Jesus travelling to Emmaus.

Third generation

THE imagery of the sea and boats has long been an inspiration to hymn writers, particularly during the late 1800s-early 1900s.

Those of you who remember the various Sankey and Moody collections of hymns will recall favourites such as Throw Out the Lifeline and Let the Lower Lights Keep Burning, metaphorically using actions at sea to save lives and comparing these to bringing people into the Christian faith, with a view to "saving" them from what could be seen as their self-destructive and anti-social life styles.

These pictures may seem somewhat dated now, and the methods of saving lives at sea have greatly improved since the RNLI was founded two hundred years ago, enabling a far greater percentage of people in need to be rescued than

was previously possible. All this, however, costs money, and, like all charities, rely on the lifeline of donations to help them continue their work.

It had come to that part of the service, known as The Collection, where the minister asked the congregation to dig deeply into their pockets. Soft music was played on the organ, and the steward quietly and with ruthless efficiency moved from person to person with the collecting plate before solemnly taking it to the minister to be blessed. The minister took the plate, looked at the contents, and then handed it back to the steward to be taken round again.

The more observant of you will have noticed that our last coffee

morning was in aid of The RNLI., so you may be wondering why our June one is also for them, effectively passing the plate around again. For the last twelve months or so we have been holding two coffee mornings for each charity we support so that our donations to the beneficiaries can be boosted. Whilst people were very generous last month we would like to be able to increase the total sum collected for the R.N.L.I., so we hope that you will be able to come and support us on Wednesday 12th June, from 10-30 until 12noon.

Our services during June will all be at 11-00am as usual, and there is an open invitation to everyone to come and join us here at the Chapel.

Very Rev Bob Key and Daphne make a visit

ON Sunday, May 5th, we welcomed The Very Reverend Bob Key and his wife, Daphne, to the Mission Community service at Stockland church.

Rev Bob spoke about the prayer initiative Thy Kingdom Come with which he has had a long association. He encouraged the congregation to follow the Novena booklet and prayer journal, which were handed out, by way of inspiration to pray daily for the 10 days between May 9th and 19th.

In the church calendar, this goes from the Day of Ascension, when Christians believe the risen Jesus returned to heaven, up until the Day of Pentecost, which is the day Christians remember the gift of the Holy Spirit falling on the disciples and filling them with all they needed to leave their place of safety and to go out into the world talking about Jesus. In the Bible, Acts chapter 1 v 14, all the followers of Jesus had returned to the room where they were staying and for ten days "all these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer".

As a Mission Community, we were also asked to "Pray through May" and

many people have prayed for our families outreach work using the guide prepared by Rev Julie Lomas and by Juletta Obudo. Tuesday mornings became a focus for prayer in our churches as either individually or in small groups people gathered. On May 15th, a chain of prayer was set up and ran through the day, linked by those involved saying The Lord's Prayer together over the telephone.

As a community of Christians, we know we are called to pray and this call to pray for one another and for people to follow Jesus continues through the rest of this year.

Wave of Prayer in mission chain

ON Wednesday, May 15th as part of Thy Kingdom Come, a prayer chain sent a Wave of Prayer across the Five Alive East Devon Mission Community.

The first prayer was said at 6.30am and the last one finished at 7.30pm.

People used various resources during their 30 minutes of prayer

Thy Kingdom Come materials were available via app, by email and booklets in churches and there was the Pray through May material as well as other resources.

Here are some of the comments from those who took part:

"It was a great opportunity to pray for family, friends and the wider church community."

"It was great to be part of a wave of prayer. I used the Chris Duffett paintings to help with the prayers. I thought his pictures were inspirational and beautiful."

"...another quiet, peaceful time praying and being close to God."

"I felt that I offloaded a heavy weight from my shoulder after the prayer. The feeling is remarkable."

"I felt very comforted and spiritually nourished. I will continue to pray for five people to come to know the love of God."

"...after usual pleasantries we said the Lord's Prayer together, 300 miles apart."

"A peaceful half hour which brought me closer to God."

And 36 people at Yarcombe church's community lunch that day all said the Lord's Prayer together!

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7).


IT was an action-packed April Saturday afternoon at the Dalwood village jumble sale.



Of India, we read...

THE Far Pavilions (MM Kaye,1978)— a doorstep of a novel — was the designated read of the month for the book club.

Despite the size, most of the group had managed to read it in the month and if not had done so sometime in the past. The novel offers an epic story of British Indian history – a magnificent romantic/historical/adventure novel set in 19th Century India, when the thin patina of English rule held down dangerously turbulent undercurrents and the ever-underlying threat of mutiny.

It is about an English male – Ashton Pelham-Martyn – an English officer during the British Raj being brought up as a Hindu and his passionate, but dangerous love for an Indian princess.

It's a story of divided loyalties, of tender camaraderie, of greedy imperialism and of the clash between east and west.

To the burning plains and snow-capped mountains of this great, humming continent, MM Kaye brings her quite exceptional gift of immediacy and meticulous historical accuracy, plus her insight into the human heart to the reader. A definite masterpiece of storytelling, and acknowledged as such by the group.

The writing is based partly on the biographical records of the author's grandfather, as well as the knowledge of her own childhood experiences in India

Discussion of the novel rewardingly revealed that the story told resonated in the life of one of the group members being born in India and with a father who was very much a part of the era of the text. Historical documents had been brought along bringing the history of the era very much into focus and alive.

It is really exciting when a novel can be added to by the personal experiences, accurate historical data and photographs that accompany texts that frequently move beyond the realms of fiction. These recollections added so much to the enjoyment of the book: thank you for sharing these.

The June text is American Blood (James Ellroy) described in a New York Times book review section as "brilliantly unpleasant"!

Archaeological treasure from the five parishes

DR Lucy Shipley recently visited Stockland Primary Academy to share her local archaeological knowledge with the children.

They were fascinated to see part of their school curriculum bought to life in her talk – illustrated by some of her 'area' finds. Without a doubt, there are many more such below Stockland soil.

Lucy said: "As the Devon Finds Liaison Officer, I record all the archaeological finds made by members of the public onto a national database as part of the Portable Antiquities Scheme.

"As local to the Five Alive area, it seemed fun to explore some of the finds that have been made in and around the parishes. Here's a very clear Roman coin, found near Membury.

"It's a nummus, a type of bronze coin that was commonly used in the 4th Century AD. This one is an early example, minted by the Emperor Galerius (AD 293-311).

Like many Roman emperors, he was a fascinating character, who married the

daughter of the Emperor Diocletian and is suggested by some as the instigator of that emperor's persecution of Christians. This particular coin was minted in Trier, in what is now Germany – one of the most common mints for coins that we find in Britain.

"The reverse type portrays 'Genio Populi Romani' – the personified local spirit, or Genius of the people of Rome.

"He holds a cornucopia, or horn of plenty, and a patera, a special dish used for ritual offerings.

"Roman coins are a really important part of my work, as those found by members of the public in Devon have transformed how we think about Roman Britain – there used to be an idea that certain coins were never found west of the Blackdown Hills, and now we know that this is untrue

"It is possible to search the date base on www.finds,org,uk and discover finds around your area. If you make any finds please email me – details are also on the website."

MEMBERS of Umborne Social Group had a very enlightening evening when Simon Card, from Devon Air Ambulance Trust, gave a talk about the work and background of the charity.

Simon is one of the 600 or so volunteers with the charity whose mission, as most people are aware, is to "relieve sickness and injury in and around Devon through provision of emergency air ambulance services".

The service went into operation in 1992 and currently operates two helicopters along with two critical care cars which cost over £10million to run annually. The charity receives no government funding and relies on public and business donations together with income generated by its shops and own lottery.

Simon pointed out that whilst all the equipment employed is state-of-the-art, the public can also play their part by using the locator app What3Words if needed in an emergency.

Such a worthwhile and important operation left everyone very impressed and one that thoroughly deserves the public's support.

The club's meetings are usually held on the first Thursday of the month at 7.30pm in Umborne Village Hall – visitors are welcome at £4 to include refreshments and raffle ticket. Further information from ann-shepherd@outlook.com.

SHUTE & WHITFORD NEWS

HEDGEHOGS are one of the UK's iconic mammal species and often come top in surveys of Britain's most popular wildlife.

However, this species is in decline – largely due to habitat loss, scarcity of food, and danger from human activity.

Whitford is a village that cares about these little creatures, and has been rewarded with a healthy population of hedgehogs. Some of us are addicted to monitoring trail camera footage, or are creeping round their gardens hogspotting late in the evening.

Still others are noticing the characteristic black, and very smelly poo that sometimes decorates the lawn in the morning.

You may have seen the 'Beware hedgehogs crossing' road signs that have appeared in Whitford over the last few months. These were donated by the parish council at the request of Maureen Davey.

At this time of year, hedgehogs are coming out of hibernation. You may see them at dusk in your garden, and you can often hear them snuffling around for food or even growling and screaming as males fight for females. Hopefully, there will be baby hogs born in Whitford later in the year.

Our hedgehog advocate in Whitford is Louise Fuller. She has qualified in basic hedgehog care and management at The Vale Wildlife Hospital and Rehabilitation Centre and supports a local wildlife charity. She has learned that the best way to encourage hedgehogs to thrive in our gardens is to provide child areas for nests and plenty of hedgehog-friendly food.

The best food is kitten biscuits (the small pellets are good for their little hedgehog mouths) or wet cat or dog food. You can also buy special hedgehog food, but this can be expensive. Hedgehogs need a bowl of water at all times, especially if you are

providing dry food and also for extra hydration in the hot summers that we have been having recently.

Several Whitford residents feed hedgehogs in their gardens and provide nesting boxes full of dry straw. However, hedgehogs are independently minded and often prefer to nest in compost heaps (please be careful when turning these over with a garden fork), in long grass (please check long grass before you use a strimmer), under piles of leaves (check before raking these up) or under piles of logs and under sheds. An untidy, undisturbed area of garden is very hedgehog-friendly.

Did you know....

- Hedgehogs should be eating earthworms and beetles - providing habitat in your garden for these invertebrates is one of the best things you can do for them.
- Hedgehogs don't eat slugs, unless they can't find anything else to eat and they only eat the really small slugs. Sadly, slugs are full of parasites

that make the hogs sick.

- Mealworms are toxic to hedgehogs, but the hogs don't know that and eat them anyway - please keep mealworms on bird tables and try and prevent them spilling onto the ground. Check the content of foods supposedly for hedgehogs - several contain mealworms.
- There is no such thing as a truly hedgehog-friendly slug pellet. Please avoid using any type of slug pellet in your garden - even the newer organic ones that claim to be safe for hedgehogs.
- Hedgehogs can roam about 5 miles in a night, and have several nest sites in their range. A small (13 cm) hole in your wall or fence is the best thing you can do to help hogs to forage widely in their quest for worms and beetles.
- Hedgehogs can swim, but they can't climb out of a steep-sided pond. Please plan a hedgehog escape route for your pond.
- Automatic lawnmowers can't tell the difference between a sleeping hedgehog and a recalcitrant tough piece of grass. The consequences can be catastrophic, please don't leave these machines unattended.
- If you see a hedgehog out in the middle of the day it is sick. The best thing to do is pick it up (using gardening gloves!), put it in a warm cardboard box and take it straight to a vet. If the hog needs treatment the vet will pass it to a wildlife charity for longer-term care.

Can you train yourself to buy fewer?

TRAINERS. Comfortable, ageless and fashionable, whether you're a committed runner or a sofa-based Olympics fan!

We probably all own at least one pair and for some people they're an obsession but the facts around their production and its effect on the environment are pretty stark.

Approximately 25billion pairs are made every year, most from a combination of plastics, metals and potentially toxic glues and dyes, often in conditions that exploit workers.

The plastic is, of course, made by burning oil, which is why the trainer industry alone produces 700million tonnes of CO2 a year. The equivalent to running 150million cars for the same amount of time... ouch. We play a part; Britain is the world's third largest

consumer of trainers after the US and China

Did you know that most trainers consist of 20-60 different component parts and require assembly using up to 300 separate procedures? This complex construction makes them difficult to recycle and most currently end up in landfill where the plastic can last for an indefinite period while heavy metals from dyes contaminate the land.

What can you do? Think about your shopping habits, do you really need another pair? Or do they still have enough life in them to give them a wipe over and pass them on to a charity shop? Most will clean up with a light brushing or a damp cloth and insoles can often be replaced. Can you put the environment above fashion?


If you really are in the market for a new pair, have a look at some of those brands trying to change things. Look for the certified B Corp logo which means that the company has had "to meet high standards of social and environmental performance, transparency and accountability".

Many new companies are making an effort to get away from the high carbon footprint of plastic-based trainers (though only 40 per cent have a sustainability policy). If you're tempted by 'vegan' trainers, check out the materials used and beware more plastic.

Whether it's couch or 5K you're planning, try to choose your footwear with the planet in mind and in the meantime, value the ones you already have!

• Top tip: Apparently, we shouldn't be tempted to machine wash trainers! They may come out looking clean but the materials take a beating and of course micro plastics might well be heading down the drain with the soapy water!




