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MARCH: WHAT A FEAST OF A MONTH

THIS year the month of March is exceptionally full!

Of course, it has its usual 31 days in length, and the Spring Equinox falls on the 19th, followed by the full moon on the 25th.


Hopefully the weather patterns might be giving us hints of a traditional spring – sunshine and only a few showers? – and the sound of lawn mowers might once again fill the air. As we move through this month, we celebrate the feast days of St David (1st) and St Patrick (17th).

We also greet Mothering Sunday (10th) and Palm Sunday (24th), which triggers the beginning of Holy Week – Maundy Thursday (28th), Good Friday (29th) and then the joy of Easter Sunday (31st).

For many of us, March this year is full because it points us week by week to the very heart of the Christian message of life in all its fullness because of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

We enter March some 15 days into the season of Lent, which is not just about giving up chocolate, or cake (at least not in the Vicarage!), but is rather a journey which takes us from "fasting to feasting".

I have a little booklet which is



printed by The Prayer Trust (www.theprayertrust.org.uk) encouraging as much focus on what we might take up as it does on what we might give up, week by week.

So, for example,

Fasting from... apathy – Feasting on... enthusiasm

Fasting from... envy – Feasting on... thankfulness

Fasting from... despair - Feasting on... trust

Fasting from... selfishness – Feasting on... generosity

Fasting from... bitterness – Feasting on... God's love

And in the last week, that which we call, Holy Week,

Fasting from... resentment - Feasting on... forgiveness

I would like to invite all of us to take notice of the month of March, and look out for ways in which we can let go of, give up, or fast from certain attitudes, and, instead, by the grace of God, embrace and take up that which is life-giving and offer harbingers of hope, joy, peace and love in a world where such things are in short supply.

May we be the ones to help restock these gifts in our part of the globe, as we listen afresh to the story of Jesus and his journey to the cross, the grave and then to new life.

May this prayer be our shared prayer this month:

Lord Jesus, may I come nearer to you this month of March. May this month be the start of something special in my life, of something to revive me at the very centre of my being. Lord, lead me from fasting to feasting, and renew me in your love. Amen.

MY FAVOURITE HYMN

In this feature each month, a different person will share with us their favourite hymn and reasons why. This month, **Chris Shepherd, licensed lay minister,** chooses **Christ is Made the Sure Foundation...**

A FAVOURITE hymn? That's a tall order, when so many tunes are wonderful, and so many words lovely and helpful too, but the two don't always go together.

I also have the problem that many of my favourites have German history and were beloved of my mother, Lobe den Herren, Praise to the Lord comes to mind, and many of Martin Luther's sturdy tunes).

But it is an English hymn which is appropriate here. I play and sing so many hymns and enjoy most of them. I say most, as some are very repetitive and have the same form: eight syllables and four lines and their tunes are not that distinguishable one from t'other.

So the request to choose just one is a real challenge. I looked back to see what we had at our wedding in case my tastes had not changed. And indeed, I found amongst our choices then a hymn with a cracking tune and good words: Christ is Made the Sure Foundation.

The words are 7th Century, a translation of urbs beata Jerusalem

and the tune is by one of our very own English composers, Henry Purcell, writing in the late 17th century.

Purcell's lovely three-quarter rhythm graces a triumphant first note, and the whole tune is positive and strong. It also gives the chance for some lovely baroque twists and turns, and the bold, confident tune beautifully undergirds the certainty of the words. The harmony is a real joy, with many lovely modulations, and the possibility in the last bars of a few tangy false relations.

And the words speak of a triumphant hope and a certain faith, and of a glorious confidence in God. If there are times when we feel less sure about 'Zion' and God's power over all, this hymn is a great one to counteract such feelings.

1 Christ is made the sure foundation, Christ the head and cornerstone, chosen of the Lord, and precious, binding all the church in one, holy Zion's help forever, and her confidence alone.

2 All that dedicated city, dearly loved of God on high, in exultant jubilation pours perpetual melody, God the One in Three adoring in glad hymns eternally.

3 To this temple, where we call You, come, O Lord of Hosts, today; with accustomed lovingkindness, hear Your servants as they pray; and Your fullest benediction shed within its walls alway.

4 Lord, here grant to all Your servants what they ask of You to gain, what they gain from You, forever with the blessed to retain, and hereafter in Your glory evermore with You to reign.

5 Praise and honour to the Father, praise and honour to the Son, praise and honour to the Spirit, ever Three, and ever One, one in might, and one in glory, while unending ages run.



Julie's inspiring stories of fostering

REV Julie Lomas came to talk to Umborne Ladies on Thursday, February 1st about her family's experience of fostering in Derbyshire.

Both Julie and her husband, Steve, had been brought up in one-parent families and Julie's grandmother had been adopted by a married aunt.

Once their own children were on the way to independence, they decided to begin the process of becoming foster parents. It's a lengthy and very intrusive journey, necessarily so but difficult at times.

Julie told the group of the brother and sister, age five and four, that came to live with them, both with special needs.

The little girl was also suffering from scoliosis of the spine and had very little verbal ability.

With tremendous hard work and commitment, huge support from other foster parents and the wider church family, not to mention the support from their own three children, the two flourished, were eventually adopted by a lovely couple and are now 12 and 11, and still in contact with Julie and Steve. They will hopefully have long and happy lives.

Julie was honest about the difficulties for foster families and the authorities trying to care for an ever increasing number of children needing care, long or short term, and directed anyone wanting to help in some way to a charity called Home for Good.

There is a need for lodgings for young adults leaving the care system with nowhere to call home, hindering further education as well as moving into adulthood.

It was inspiring and shocking to hear first-hand and made everyone present sit up and think.



Earth Hour this year takes place from 8.30pm to 9.30pm on Saturday, March 23rd.


We would ask that all readers will take part in supporting Earth Hour 2024 by undertaking the following actions during the designated hour:

No ifs, no butts - get a pocket ashtray

CIGARETTE butts are the most littered item on the Earth, blown by the wind, washed into our drains by the rain, escaping into the waterways and then our oceans, breaking down into microplastics and these eventually find their way into the food chain.

Approximately six trillion (yes that's 6,000,000,000,000,000) cigarettes are purchased each year around the world and of these, around four trillion cigarette butts are tossed away to pollute the natural world annually.

Smokers feel they are being tidy by putting them in the public drains and are unaware that these eventually make their way into our rivers and oceans to be eaten by marine life and birds who mistake them for food.

Those cigarette ends left on the



ground are equally polluting as they break down into microplastics. Have a watch of this short clip from Litter Free Dorset which illustrates the problem: Bin Your Butt animation (YouTube).

Did you know that apart from plastic, cigarette butts contain arsenic, nicotine, lead and other chemicals? They are hazardous to animals, birds, marine life and researchers have found that they even affect plant growth.


An American epidemiologist reported that "one cigarette butt in a litre of water, kills half the fish" (National Geographic).

Stockland Past and Present



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
