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MARCH: LONGER DAYS AND SIGNS OF SPRING

THE month of March is before us. As we move into the third month of the year, we have much to be grateful for not least the lengthening of the days, the signs of spring emerging all around us, and the need to remember to write 03 instead of 02 in the date sections of our cheques and other forms!

In the churches across our area, March 2nd is when we mark the beginning of the season of Lent with a choice of two services for Ash Wednesday — one at 9.30am in Dalwood and one at 7pm in Stockland. The tradition of receiving ashes on the forehead or on the hand goes back many centuries, and is one that is significant in my life as marking the change in focus towards Holy Week and Easter.



Another tradition is that we are encouraged to deny ourselves something, give something up for Lent. My pledge this year is to

decline the many delicious cakes that are on offer — please hold me to this — and I know that some of you have already told me that there are things in your life you want to lay down, detox from your life, and through the discomfort that this may incur to bring about a welcome change in your health and well-being. In a world where if you want it you can have it, and have it now, the idea of denying yourself something is counter cultural, and yet there is something deeply humbling and strangely fulfilling about this time of decrease, less, and even abstention.

Another idea is that we use this time during Lent to take up something new — across the mission community we will be offering a weekly study group on a Thursday at 2pm; contemplation and meditation on Mondays at 7pm and the ancient office of Compline at 9pm on Wednesdays. All of these will be on Zoom so please do take up one, or all, of these and participate wherever you live.

Something else to take up is to join in with the weekly Lent lunches on offer in Kilmington, enjoying good food and company and helping to raise money for those less fortunate. Dalwood church is also organising Little Lent Lunches.

March also marks the beginning of the wedding season, and I am looking forward with great joy to

welcoming Rev Anne Mills to Stockland to share with me in the marriage of Becky Dorson and Sean Spiller. We wish them and all the couples getting married this year a long and successful life of togetherness, supported and strengthened by God and the local church and community.

What else is happening? There is the World Day of Prayer on Friday, March 4th; St Patrick's Day on March 17th and, as we approach the end of the month, on the night of March 26th we are encouraged to switch off our lights for Earth Hour between 8.30pm and 9.30pm.



Then we must remember to alter our clocks by that hour (spring forward) before finding many ways to enjoy Mothering Sunday on the 27th.

PSALM OF THE MONTH

PSALM 77 - chosen by DAVID WILSDON

THIS is very much a psalm of two halves. At first, the day of trouble leads to a most disturbed night of worry and frustration, bringing questions and doubts that border on blasphemy, when attempts to reach the ear of God seem to be of no avail.

Then, verse 11, a solution is found when the works and wonders of the Lord are both remembered and called to mind! Meditation on them make it clear that there is nowhere that God's presence does not hold sway.

PSALM 77

2. In the day of my trouble I have sought the Lord; by night my hand is stretched out and does not tire; my soul refuses comfort.

3. I think upon God and I groan; I ponder, and my spirit faints.

4. You will not let my eyelids close; I am so troubled that I cannot speak.

5. I consider the days of old; I remember the years long past;

6. I commune with my heart in the night; my spirit searches for understanding.

7. Will the Lord cast us off for ever? Will he no longer show his favour?

8. Has his loving mercy clean gone for ever?

Has his promise come to an end for evermore?

9. Has God forgotten to be gracious? Has he shut up his compassion in displeasure?

10. And I said, "My grief is this: that the right hand of the Most High has lost its strength."

11. I will remember the works of the Lord and call to mind your wonders of old time.

12. I will meditate on all your works and ponder your mighty deeds.

13. Your way, O God is holy; who is so great a god as our God?

14. You are the God who worked wonders and declared your power among the peoples.

15. With a mighty arm you redeemed your people, the children of Jacob and Joseph.

16. The waters saw you, O God; the waters saw you and were afraid; the depths also were troubled.

17. The clouds poured out water; the skies thundered; your arrows flashed on every side;

18. The voice of your thunder was in the whirlwind; your lightnings lit up the ground; earth trembled and shook.

19. Your way was in the sea, and your paths in the great waters, but your footsteps were not known.

20. You led your people like sheep by the hand of Moses and Aaron.

This meant they could get to talk with the churchwardens, organists, bell captain, as well as Rev Julie and Rev Nigel Freathy who will be conducting the weddings.

After the meet-and-greet session, and more coffee and cake, Gill and Julie got everyone talking about their ideas and expectations of their wedding day and their marriage.

Linked to the Married by Design booklet which every couple receives as part of their take-home bag, the conversation focused on the three sets of promises that the couples make during the ceremony and what those words mean.

I'm delighted to say, however, that a new boiler is now in place and working well. All I have to do now is to get to grips with the time clock and thermostat so we don't roast!

Because of the heating problems we had to delay the start of a new venture, a Tea & Tots Club.

The first meeting was finally held on February 7th, and we were very pleased with both the numbers who came and the atmosphere there.

We are currently holding two meetings a month on Mondays from 10am to 11.30am, but we will be reviewing this in the light of demand.

Our art club restarted on February 9th, and our first coffee morning of the year, to raise funds for Children's Hospice South West, on February 28th. These will be held on the last Monday of the month thereafter, all to raise funds for charities operating in this area.

Services at the chapel are all at 11am in March, and it is nice to be able to assure you all of a warm welcome once more, in more ways than one.

Pupils hear parable of the two houses

Looking back nearly 30 years at this magazine

WHAT was in *The Parishes' Paper* in September 1993?

Caroline and I moved into Popehayne Farm on September 29th in 1993 and a kind person delivered a copy of that month's *The Parishes' Paper*. I thought I would share with you what that edition had to say about events in the parishes at that time.

Unfortunately, Yarcombe was not part of the Five Alive Mission Community at that time and so apologies if Yarcombe feels a bit left out.

The Rev David Mosely was our Priest-in-Charge resident in the vicarage at Kilmington and The Rev Norton Giddings was the Hon Assistant Curate living in Stockland vicarage.

Andrew Vagg, from Whitford, and Nicola Lewis were married on August 7th and went to live in Helmstedt Way, Chard.

Dennis Matthews wrote that the committee organising the Whitford show that year was unable to acquire a PA system but, nevertheless, thanked all those who played a part in making the afternoon of August 7th such an enjoyable event.

At Musbury and Whitford, the Sausage Sizzle raised £618.07 to help the Children's Hospice South West and Eve Morris expressed her thanks to everyone for helping to raise this magnificent sum.

Pat Lambert wrote an interesting piece about the Umborne Mystery Evening Tour, there is no mention of the route taken except to say that they all ended up, both hungry and thirsty, at the Awliscombe Inn.

Thanks went to Ray and Betty for helping to organise the tour.

In Stockland, Help the Aged raised £135 and Jane Forrest thanked everyone who donated.

Also at Stockland the school term ended in July with the sports day which was won by Hawkins House. Mrs Eleanor Wright kindly presented

afternoon for small schools at Hawkchurch.

Dalwood Village Hall 100 club — which is still running — announced its winners for the month: 1st prize of £20 went to Mrs Cousins; 2nd to Mr and Mrs Saner, £10; and 3rd prize to the Bowls Club, with Kathy Laing congratulating all the winners!

GM Harding announced the results of the house-to-house collection in Kilmington raising funds for Cancer Research.

Harry Price announced that the Kilmington Branch of the Royal British Legion had invited Mrs Antonia Hunt to talk to members about her life in occupied France during the Second World War.

Incidentally, her book, *Little Resistance: A Teenage English Girl's Adventures in Occupied France*, is still available at Amazon for £2.38 plus postage.

The paper had only one advertiser in September 1993, Shoobridge Funeral Services, the "Husband and Wife Funeral Directors" based in Honiton and Sidmouth.

The Parishes' Paper at that time was in black and white, 11 pages long, produced on a typewriter and then possibly photocopied. If anyone can remember who was involved in producing the paper at this time please let me know.

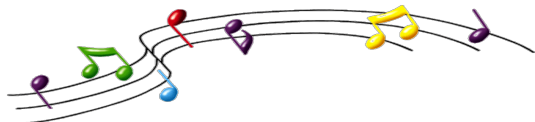

Disability inclusion recognition award

LOCAL young woman Elana-May Blackmore has written an article on encouraging disability inclusion in churches...

HELLO, my name is Elana-May, some of you know me if you live in Kilmington. I am 20 and I have autism.

For some people, it may be easy to understand; some other people might find it hard to understand. I was deeply moved by the ministry Through the Roof, a registered charity that helps transform lives through Jesus with people who are disabled.

Quite often we read in the Bible how Jesus transformed the life of a disabled person; he walked alongside them; he healed them physically, and he spiritually restored them too.

In the UK today there are 12 billion people like myself who are living with a form of disability whether physical or mental. We are often overlooked and we have less access to education, transport and housing; but Jesus can still use us for his glory!

That's why Through the Roof is helping bring awareness to Disability in Churches; as we all know; we have had the arrival of Rev Julie and her equally amazing husband, "Uncle" Steve Lomas. They have been an incredible support to me over the months they have been here and made me feel included and a part of St Giles's Church.

They have had experience fostering and ministering to those who have had an additional need in the past. I feel like we have already formed such an amazing friendship; getting to know them as people and not just 'a vicar and her husband'. They have really helped me to realise we aren't so different. I am so blessed that they see God-given potential in me; they see my heart to help others like myself. I thought I would encourage

them by nominating them for a Luke 5 Award. They duly received their award via the post.

The award is based on Luke 5:17-19: *"One day Jesus was teaching, and Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting there. They had come from every village of Galilee and from Judea and Jerusalem. And the power of the Lord was with Jesus to heal the sick. Some men came carrying a paralysed man on a mat and tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. When they could not find a way to do this because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and lowered him on his mat through the tiles into the middle of the crowd, right in front of Jesus."*

Stunning tower at parish church

THE most significant gem of the village of Stockland must surely be the Church of St Michael and All Angels with its imposing 100-foot tower.

Early documentation indicates that the church stands on Saxon foundations with much of the current building being constructed in the 15th Century.

The Western Tower is indicative of the latter re-building. The fine perpendicular upper stages added in that period were most certainly built on much earlier foundations: the lower window is clearly much older.

The tower overshadows what appears to be a typical Anglo-Saxon burial ground in shape and structure. These characteristically were roughly oval in shape and enclosed by surrounding ditches of water.

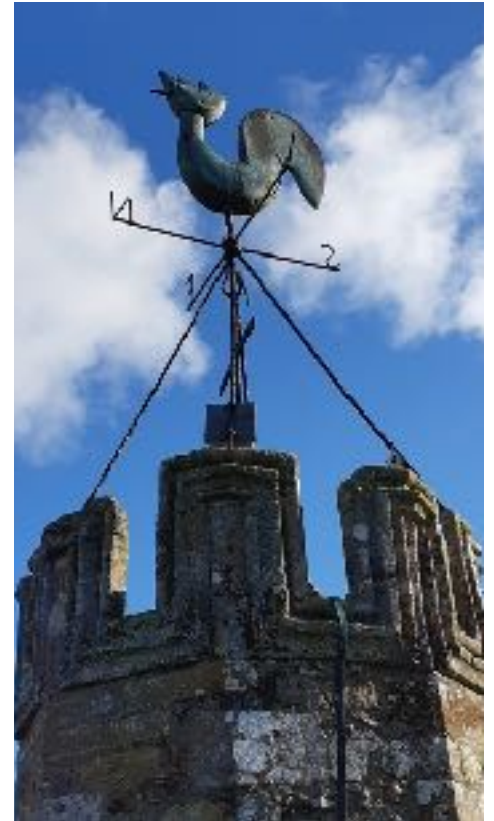
This colossus of a monument soars above the church and dominates the village — seemingly so far below — with the vista of the Blackdown Hills. And the Devon and Somerset countryside spread before it.

A climb to the top reveals the splendour of the view — such visits are rare and indeed it is likely that many parishioners have only viewed the tower from ground level.

On a stunning November day in 2021 with beautiful blue skies, such a view took place.

With cameras at the ready, some breath-taking photographs emerged accentuating its awesome height and dominance of the landscape as well as offering a tribute to its early founding fathers in its architecturally deliberately low, typically Saxon siting of the original religious edifice.

IT has been announced that the National Trust property Shute Barton will be reopening for public visits in 2022.

During the pandemic, the National Trust announced that public visits to Shute Barton would cease and that Shute Barton would be run solely as a holiday property.

However, following a grassroots campaign which was covered in the regional and national media, the National Trust conducted a consultation with the local community which led to this announcement of the property's reopening.

Before the pandemic, the property was open for public tours on four weekends a year.

St Michael's Church offered tea and cakes to the visitors with help from the Friends of Shute Church, and considerable funds would be raised by this for the maintenance of the Church.

In 2022, Shute Barton will again be open for eight days. The days will be as follows: Wednesday and Thursday, June 15th and 16th; Saturday and Sunday, July 2nd and 3rd; Wednesday and Thursday, October 12th and 13th; Saturday and Sunday, November 19th and 20th.

It is intended that, as before, the church will again be open to serve refreshments and welcome visitors to Shute.

Consultations will be continuing between the local community and the National Trust to develop further ways in which the property can benefit the local community, and also further ways in which the rich history of the property and the parish can be told, particularly through the church.

Historical research continues to bring many new discoveries about the history of Shute, and these will be publicised as part of this continuing collaboration.

Volunteers are always needed to assist with serving refreshments in the church to the visitors.

A number of occasional in-person events have been held in the latter part of 2021, including

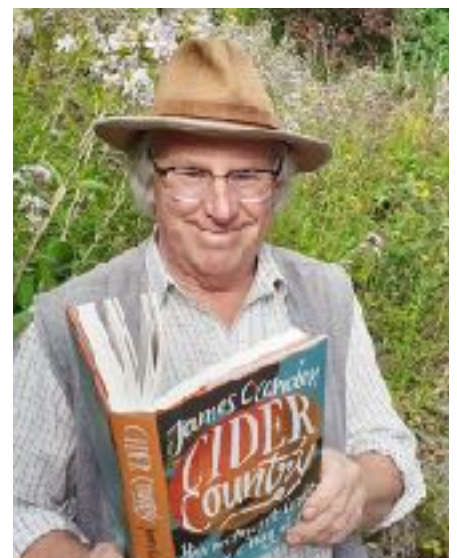
talking walks, lectures and concerts.

Sustainable Stockland gives thoughts for action

TUESDAY, February 1st saw the second meeting of the new Sustainable Stockland environment group at the King's Arms.

After an initial exploration of ideas before Christmas, it was fantastic to have a large group of people all keen and upbeat about the positive environmental impact they could make together in 2022.

The group was pleased to welcome Vicky Whitworth, of Chardstock Eco Group, who gave an inspiring talk about the work of her group and all they have achieved in their first year together, including work on a biodiversity audit, tree planting, litter picking and planning a community engagement event.

Vicky gave visitors a demo of her

water quality testing kit, complete with water freshly collected from the River Kit.

It was fascinating to hear how Chardstock residents are taking part in a citizen science volunteer project, supported by the Westcountry Rivers Trust, to monitor river water quality across the River Axe catchment area. The Axe and its tributaries are declining in condition and so this monitoring is hugely valuable to be able to understand and protect waterways.

Group members were so impressed that several of the Stockland team have volunteered to monitor the water quality in this neck of the woods — including the local stretch of the River Yarty, as well as the Cory and Umbourne Brooks.

The group also learnt about the planned works to protect the Stockland Great Castle ancient monument, discussed the feasibility of installing an electric vehicle charging point in the village, shared book recommendations.

Those gathered also heard from teenage members of the group about the importance of educating young people on environmental matters and also had a really spirited and thought-provoking conversation about how the group can learn more about the pressures that our farming neighbours face in relation to the environment and climate change.

GROUP WANTS LOCALS TO **BECOME 'PLASTIC-SMART'**



PLASTIC Free Axminster was formed in 2019 and is working under the auspices of the marine charity Surfers Against Sewage, to gain plastic-free status for the town.

It is the group's over-riding belief that plastic, especially single-use plastic and the world's obsession with it, is ruining the countryside, the rivers and oceans and health. There is ample proof of this: 40 per cent of plastic produced is for single-use and 91 per cent of plastic ever produced is still in the environment, which is just shocking. There are, of course, areas where its use is necessary for health and hygiene reasons.

Lucy Siegle, journalist and writer on environmental issues, sums it up: "What this is, is a battle against avoidable, unwanted, useless, nuisance plastic, that is unnecessarily forced upon us and then into the natural environment, where its impact is devastating."

Plastic Free Axminster wants to

encourage the citizens of the town and surrounding parishes to reduce their dependence on plastic, to become more plastic-smart and to spread the message of its dangers to the planet and to human beings, animals and marine life.

Plastic Free Axminster volunteers, pictured, can be seen taking part in litter picks around the town on a regular basis. The group has pop-up events at various venues and attends local events such as Light Up Axminster and the Axe Vale show. Through the Facebook page, members encourage simple swaps to more sustainable products and share tips on how the public can reduce dependence on plastic. With a little bit of perseverance, everyone can do it.

Schools and nurseries can sign up to the initiative to be plastic-free, and businesses may like to know how to cut single-use plastic and become a Business Champion. Or community groups or churches can find out more. Plastic Free

Talk on Children's Society work

WE are most familiar with the work of the Children's Society through the annual Christingle services at Christmas, when we take the orange and decorate it with different symbols, and raise money for this charity.

We are delighted that local representative Chris Shepherd is coming to speak about the broader work of the charity in Kilmington at 9.30am and in Dalwood at 11am on Sunday, March 27th, which also happens to be Mothering Sunday.

Here's what she has to say by way of introduction: "Mothering Sunday is a day when, originally, people thought about their 'mother church', the church they were born into. More recently though we have thought about parenting, about thanking our mothers for all they do,

and about all the important skills of looking after the next generation! What on earth — literally — could be more important than caring for, nurturing and loving our young? And it's not just mothers, of course — it's fathers too, and other responsible adults.

"We like to think that children today have a better time than in the Dickensian days of orphanages, workhouses, and children on the streets begging for food and without shelter. And though that era is over — an era in which Edward Rudolph founded the first homes for the Church of England Children's Society — unfortunately things are not better; in many ways, they are worse these days.

"You will have read on the news of child exploitation: county lines, grooming and abuse of all kinds. Many children are 'looked-after', or have run away and left home through family breakdown, or are

themselves carers, suffering stress and mental health problems. Bullying is rife in schools, and refugee children can turn up without their families. It's hard being a child today.

"The Children's Society made the tough decision a few years ago to focus mainly on teenagers, aged 10-18. Many teenagers these days are at risk, and some of the worst problems in our society occur because their longing for love and security can make them vulnerable, abused and exploited by criminal gangs and in danger of being seen as criminals themselves.

"I'll be coming to talk to you on Mothering Sunday this year about some of the problems faced by young people today, and ways in which the Children's Society is trying to tackle problems, and give young people hope, whether through campaigning or through projects and funding counsellors."

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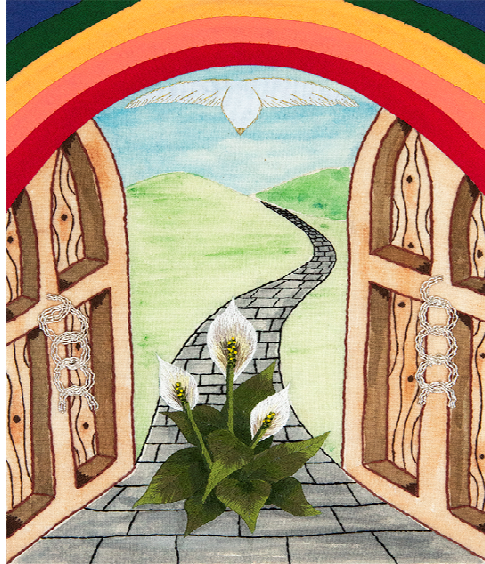

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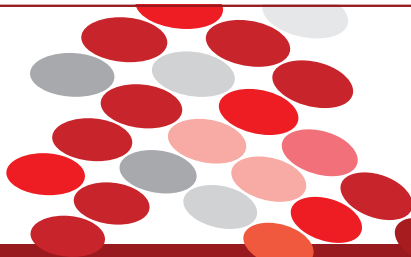
